Activities

- Divide students into small groups and ask them to brainstorm about the definition of international communication.
- Open class discussion: Explore the foundations of world-system theory and electronic colonialism theory. List student responses on the board. The instructor should make sure that the interrelationship dimension is discussed.
- Have students search the World Wide Web for information about the New World Information and Communication Order (NWICO). Ask

- each student to bring to class information regarding the history of NWICO, the debate about NWICO, the issues (2 sides), and the nations that support NWICO.
- Ask students to browse through the Sunday paper and ask them to find an international news story. Students will share their articles in class. The instructor and students will evaluate the stories and their newsworthiness.
- Take-Home Assignment: students should explain in writing if they think that US values are exported to peripheral nations. Students must explain in detail.
