

AOGS Checklist for Authors.

1. Have you carefully read the current Instructions for Authors on the journal's homepage?
2. Have you checked that your manuscript is in line with the journal's usual style and format and looked at a recent issue for this?
3. Is the typescript correct?
4. Is the title informative, appealing, not too long and without proprietary/generic names?
5. Do all authors truly fulfill the criteria for authorship?
6. Are affiliations marked correctly and institutional names in correct English, using capitals and small letters as seen in a recent issue?
7. Is the corresponding author entered on the front page in the correct way?
8. Is the abstract correctly done for the type of article that you are submitting?
9. Have you selected keywords correctly?
10. Have you made a list of abbreviations?
11. Are article headings in line with the journal's requirements and style?
12. Are your aims stated at the end of the Introduction?
13. Have you described all relevant aspects of the material?
14. Have you described the methods so that someone else could reproduce the work?
15. Is ethical permission stated adequately?
16. Are analytical and statistical methods described so that the work can be repeated or recalculated?
17. Have you given adequate details of statistical results (more than p-values where appropriate)?
18. Is the power of your material and its statistical handling such that you can draw conclusions from it?
19. Have you had advice from a trained biostatistician or someone with similar knowledge?
20. Have you ensured that there is no duplication or unnecessary repetition between text and tables, Material and Methods and Results or Discussion?
21. Have you discussed advantages and problems that might be inherent in your study?
22. Is your Discussion in line with the Results and without overstatement?
23. Is there a conclusion at the end of the Discussion?
24. Have you read through with a view to eliminating unnecessary words and sentences?
25. Can the manuscript be considered concise and factual?
26. Has the scientific English been checked and verified by a qualified person or agency?
27. Is spelling correct and in American English?
28. Have you observed the journal's specific linguistic requirements?
29. Are the Acknowledgements in line with the journal's requirements?
30. Is the reference style correct?
31. Do the tables/figures contain a descriptive legend with enough information to allow it to be comprehended without reference to the text?
32. Are the tables easy to comprehend and in line with what can be seen in the journal?
33. Have you given information on a previous submission(s) in your cover letter?
34. If you submitted before have you addressed criticism raised and made changes in accordance with that and AOGS style and format?
