

MANUSCRIPT STYLE

Journal of Sensory Studies welcomes your submissions. For consideration in the journal, you must follow the guidelines in this style guide. Failure to do so can result in rejection without review.

- The language of the journal is American English.
- 12-point type in one of the standard fonts: Times, Helvetica, or Courier is preferred.
- It is not necessary to double-line space your manuscript.
- Line numbers must be included on manuscripts.
- Tables must be on separate pages after the reference list, and not be incorporated into the main text.
- Figures should be uploaded as separate figure files. See information below about figures.

During the submission process (<http://mc.manuscriptcentral.com/joss>) you must enter:

- Full title of Article
- Short descriptive title of up to 70 characters for a running title
- Names, affiliations, and e-mails addresses of all authors. Make sure the full address, including email, telephone and fax, of the corresponding author who will be listed as the contact author and will be responsible for all correspondence including checking proofs is included.
- Provide the names and email addresses of two potential reviewers of the manuscript.
- Keywords

Starting on the first page, include:

- Full title of Article
- Short Running title
- Authors (use superscripts to refer to affiliations)
 - Note: all authors should have made major contributions in 2 or more areas such as conceptualization, determining objectives and planning the research; ensuring appropriate conduct of the research; analysis; interpretation of data; writing and editing of the manuscript. Simply conducting the lab work is not sufficient for authorship.
- Affiliations
- Contact information (name, e-mail, telephone, fax) of corresponding author
- If needed, include the name(s) of any sponsor(s) of the research, along with grant number(s).

Starting on the second page, include:

- **Abstract** of approximately 150 words for all articles. An abstract is a concise summary of the whole paper, not just the conclusions, and is understandable without reference to the rest of the paper. It should contain no citation to other published work.

- **Practical Applications** – a short description of not more than 150 words of the practical uses--actual or potential--of the research presented in your manuscript. Do not simply restate the abstract. This should appear just below the abstract.
- **Keywords** - Include up to six keywords that describe your paper for indexing purposes.

Starting on the next page:

The **main text** for research articles should follow the arrangement described below. Review articles may follow a different format (Authors considering submission of review articles must contact the editor before submission to obtain further information).

Research Articles

- **Introduction:** State the background and reason for the work in relation to the field, indicating what new contribution needs to be made by the work described. Be brief, but cover the topic.
- **Materials and Methods:** Provide enough information to allow other investigators to repeat the work. Avoid repeating the details of procedures that have already been published elsewhere, unless the reference to essential methods or terminology is available only in a language other than English or is likely to be unavailable through normal scientific channels such as libraries, download, or interlibrary loan.

The following information must be included in the methods:

For descriptive studies using established panels who regularly conduct sensory work, the number of panelists, length and types of training, length or experience, and types of panel monitoring should be given. *For descriptive studies using panelists trained specifically* for that study or short-term projects, the number of panelists, screening, length and type of training, validation conducted, and monitoring should be given. For all descriptive studies, the type of method used and the number of panel members should be given. If any elimination of panelists or data was done, the criteria for elimination must be given.

For consumer studies, the number of consumers, basic demographic information (e.g. age and gender percentages), and qualifications (e.g. product use characteristics) must be given. Information on the pool of respondents (i.e. locations, college students, company employees) also should be given to assist with understanding the limitations of the results. Major limitations, such as the use of technical faculty and staff as consumers for a product study must be fully addressed in the discussion of results. Use of inappropriate consumers is a reason for rejection.

Samples: Sample source, storage, preparation methods, temperature, serving size, number of samples per session and time between samples, serving order design, use of carriers and other key information on the sensory test should be provided in the methods. In addition, a clear statement on replication, if appropriate, should be included. Were there actual replicate samples (different production, different batches) or were duplicates (same lot number/batch served multiple times) used.

Environmental conditions: A statement of environmental conditions, such a lighting and temperature, that may affect testing should be made. In addition, whether the test was conducted in a laboratory, a mall, in home, etc. should be stated.

Analysis: The specific data analysis should be stated.

• **Results:** Present results as concisely as possible to answer the stated objectives. Do not use tables and figures to present the same data. The results should be organized in a logical manner. Articles in Journal of Sensory Studies should have a major emphasis on the sensory results or implications and, if appropriate, how they relate to other measures that were taken. Studies where sensory analysis or the analysis of sensory data is a small part of the overall study generally will not be accepted.

• **Discussion:** Interpret the results here. The results should not be repeated. The results and discussion sections can be combined if desired.

• **References:** Responsibility for the accuracy of citations rests entirely with the author(s). Reference to other works, particularly recent works in Journal of Sensory Studies or other appropriate journals is expected in the Introduction, Methods, and Results/Discussion. Please note that it is appropriate and necessary to cite articles from years past (sometimes many years past), but authors should recognize that information advances. Articles that do not provide current information and some recent citations (usually past 2 years) likely will not be published. In the text, give references by the surname of the authors and the year, using *et al.* when there are more than two authors. For example: "... were found by Smith and Jones (2010)"; "Many authors (Smith and Jones 2010; Williams and Brown 2009; Miller *et al.* 2010) reported..." In the References section, list all authors, organizing the references alphabetically by the primary author's surname. See a current issue of Journal of Sensory Studies for examples of referencing both within the paper and in the reference section.

Reference style. References to papers should indicate the name of the journal, following the abbreviation used in *Chemical Abstracts*. Many journal abbreviations can be found at: <http://cassi.cas.org/search.jsp>

Reference to papers that have been published or have been fully accepted for publication are appropriate. Refer to submitted papers that have not yet been accepted by such terms as "unpublished observations" or "private communication". Use such resources only when absolutely necessary. If the work is integral to the current submission, the reviewers may request to see a copy of that work or communication.

Follow standard nomenclature as used in the scientific literature and avoid laboratory jargon. If abbreviations or trade names are used, define the material or compound the first time that it is mentioned.

References should be listed in the following style:

For Journal articles: LAST NAME, INITIAL.INITIAL. Title in sentence case. Journal Name using abbreviation. *Volume number in Italics(issue number if pages are not consecutively numbered)*, page numbers.

Illustrations/Figures. Figures should be intelligible without reference to the text, though each one should be referenced in the text. Number illustrations/figures consecutively with Arabic numerals. The titles of all illustrations should appear on a separate page as in the following example:

A figure caption necessary to explaining the figure usually should be included in the figure at the bottom. If that is not possible, it may be included as a subtitle immediately underneath the title in sentence case.

Upload each figure as a separate file in either .tiff or .eps format, with the figure number and the top of the figure indicated. Compound figures e.g. 1a, b, c should be uploaded as one figure. Tints are not acceptable. Lettering must be of a reasonable size that would still be clearly legible upon reduction, and consistent within each figure and set of figures – typically 10 point or larger. Where a key to symbols is required, please include this in the artwork itself, not in the figure legend. More detailed information on the submission of electronic artwork can be found at <http://authorservices.wiley.com/bauthor/illustration.asp> All illustrations must be supplied at the correct resolution:

- Black and white and color photos - 300 dpi
- Graphs, drawings, etc - 800 dpi preferred; 600 dpi minimum
- Combinations of photos and drawings - 500 dpi
 - Note: Color may be included at an extra cost to authors. If color is necessary to the paper, a quote can be provided by Wiley Blackwell.

Acknowledgments. Where applicable, list acknowledgments on a separate page.

Acknowledgments should be limited only to those people or institutions outside the person's

own laboratory that provided major help or assistance of a type that would not qualify them for authorship.
