Examples of Compass Articles

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Length and Scope

The length of the article should be agreed with the Section Editor before you begin writing. The medium Compass articles are 2-5000 words in length and the long articles are 5000 words and over. The Section Editor will agree the topic of your article with you before you begin to write your piece.

Compass articles typically fall into two categories: firstly, articles which give your perspective on an area of research whilst also providing an overview of the field. Secondly, articles which focus on the state of the field itself, perhaps reviewing the current research on a topic, considering new electronic resources, looking at new methods of teaching and so on. Compass articles should always offer some reference to the current scholarship and be accessible to the non-specialist.

History Compass readers will be able to cite your article in their publications, email details of the article to their colleagues, or use it in their class reading lists.

Style Guidelines

The Oxford Style Manual should be used for inline citations and Bibliographies. Examples can be found towards the end of these guidelines.

Abstract

Please provide a short abstract (about 50-100 words) which should give the reader an idea of what your article will be about before they see the main text.

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Style Guidelines

All file versions of History Compass articles should include:

- an Abstract
- a Bibliography
- endnotes in every case

UK or US style?

UK or US spelling and punctuation may be adopted but, whichever conventions are used, they must be followed consistently throughout.

e.g. UK / US
geographical / geographic
manoeuvre / maneuver
catalogue / catalog
modelled / modeled
centre / center
behaviour / behavior
analyse / analyze

Quotations

Short prose quotations (<30 words) should run on within the normal sentence structure. Long prose quotations (>30 words) should be indented by the normal paragraph indent and do not require quotation marks. They should be set smaller than the normal text type, with no extra space above or below.

Abstract, Endnotes and Bibliography

Every article *must* have an abstract at the beginning of your manuscript.

References should appear sequentially throughout as endnotes. Endnotes should be in the format 1, 2, 3 rather than i, ii, iii. The endnote format for books, journal articles, book chapters and web references is as below. Ibid may be used, while publisher names should be written out in full, e.g. Cambridge University Press rather than CUP.

A partial/full bibliography *must* appear after the endnotes, listing all/major texts cited/consulted in alphabetical order by the surname of the first author.

- Spaced initials
(e.g. W. W. Norton)
- Full stops after an editor abbreviation
(e.g. (ed.) or (eds.))
- Full stops after a doctor abbreviation
(e.g. Dr.)
- Full stops after et al

- (e.g. R. Stewart et al. (eds.), ...)
- When a volume number appears between a work's overall title and the volume title, put 'Vol.' in italics with a capital letter
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
